
Community Strongly Opposes Permanent Encampments

A public opinion survey of registered Portland voters conducted in late March by Peak Insights reveals three key takeaways on voter opinions on local Portland issues.

1) The Portland City Council has seen a dramatic decline in net support over the past 15 months and is now underwater.

A new poll, conducted March 21-26 by Peak Insights, shows only 34% of Portland voters now have a favorable opinion of the Portland City Council, while 51% view them unfavorably, that's a net favorability of -17%. This is in stark contrast to a December 2022 poll conducted by Peak Insights when the City Council was viewed favorably by 55% of Portland voters, and unfavorably by 32% -- a net favorability of +23%. This is a net shift of 40 points to the negative in just 15 months.

VOTER OPINION OF PORTLAND CITY COUNCIL



2) While the City Council suffers from quite a negative image, Mayor Mark Dion enjoys a roughly 2:1 positive image (49% favorable/26% unfavorable) among these very same voters.

The strong positive image of Mayor Dion is not very different from the positive image we found for former mayor Kate Snyder in December of 2022, when 53% of Portland voters viewed her favorably and 21% viewed her unfavorably.


VOTER OPINION OF PORTLAND MAYOR



3) Portland voters' strong opposition to the City Council proposal allowing camping on public lands is widespread.

Survey respondents are strongly opposed to a Council proposal that would allow camping on public land in Portland. Voters oppose this proposal by more than a 2 to 1 margin (63% oppose/28% support), with a majority (52%) of voters "strongly" opposed. Opposition comes from most all demographic groups. Camping on public lands in Portland does not appear to be an idea whose time has come.

This survey was conducted March 21-26, 2024, by Peak Insights. A total of 250 live and online interviews were conducted among registered voters in the city of Portland, Maine. The potential sampling error is plus or minus 6% at the 95% confidence level.
